From the Minister's Desk

“Jesus said, ‘I am the way, the truth and the life. No-one comes to the Father except through me.’” John 14: 6

Dear Friends,

In the midst of the debates about how Donald Trump was elected US President and why the UK voted for Brexit, I have been filled with a kind of unease about one of the background factors in it all.

Let me be clear that I am not criticising one side or another as I make this reflection; there are solid arguments that can be made on different sides. However, I am concerned about the way that facts are challenged by people championing a cause, and the way that this is soaked up by many in the crowds.

Yes, economics is not an exact science, and politics makes strange claims, but too often truth has been the casualty of the debates of this past year, and people with expertise and knowledge in specialist areas have been sidelined by ‘what we think’.

For a UK example, the bus advertisement claiming that the UK sends the EU £350 million per week was allowed to make that claim for months, despite it being demonstrably simply wrong. Half of that amount was in the rebate that never went to the EU in the first place.

There were certainly good arguments for leaving the EU, and many would have been persuaded of their value without the bus advert. But its use in the campaign was a dangerous sign of departing from the truth.

I didn't get my heart operation done by someone who won a popularity contest – I barely met the surgeon – but I trusted an expert who knew what he was doing and had the qualifications to do it. The same is required for those building the new Queensferry Crossing.

Truth matters. Expertise counts. And this is true for faith itself. I have seen extraordinary claims made about Christian faith in recent years by people with great skill in television or book writing, but little or no understanding of ancient history or the language and literature of Biblical times.

It is vital that we all stand up for what is right and true, even when it is uncomfortable for us to say it. And the Gospel itself is a message we can trust, with values that are good for us all. God's Word challenges the way we live and love and serve in this world, and we must never lose sight of this in the chaos of political campaigns – or the daily lives we lead.

THE PERSECUTED CHURCH

Were you frightened to come to Church last Sunday? Did you wonder if you would return home safely or perhaps you would be attacked or a bomb might be thrown into the Church or acid would be thrown into your face when you left Church?

These are real concerns for some of our Christian brothers and sisters in other countries. A few weeks ago some of us heard first-hand accounts from three men who were in the thick of such attacks. One pastor from Uganda was attacked with acid and endured many months of surgery to repair his face and body. Another pastor who is also an eminent surgeon spoke of performing operations while under attack from bombs in Aleppo. A third spoke of losing family members during attacks while celebrating Easter in a public park in Pakistan this year. We saw harrowing pictures and heard of atrocities against Christians, beheadings, hangings crucifixions of men, women and even children – all done in the name of Allah. Of course, it is not only in Muslim countries where persecution takes place. Christians in Hindu and Buddhist countries also suffer discrimination, violence and often death. Even in England a former Muslim who is now a Christian has had to have his family rehoused and is under police protection today – all because they have become followers of Jesus.

Although violence is just one of the forms of persecution that Christians face, they have property looted, churches, homes, businesses etc. torched. They are forced from their homes, suffer physical assault, may be arrested, imprisoned, tortured and even executed. Judges and lawyers receive death threats – and some have been killed – for representing Christians in Court. Even when a natural disaster affects people of every faith, Christians are likely to suffer more as they will not receive help from non-Christian aid agencies or government authorities.

There are Ministries supporting the persecuted Christians around the world – for example Barnabas Fund, Open Doors and Release. They ask for our prayers and support and information about these ministries can be found on the table at the back of our Church here.

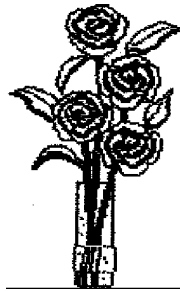

THE CHURCH PROPERTY DEVELOPMENT FOCUS GROUP

The Property Focus Group has had further discussions with our architect on the feasibility of the proposed scheme to redevelop the sanctuary with flexible seating, install an effective efficient heating system and create new meeting room, kitchen and toilet facilities in the area under the gallery. The initial financial figures that were provided exceeded the budget that had been suggested to us by representatives of the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland and we are at present working on details of plans and specifications to contain costs without adversely affecting our ultimate aims.

At its meeting in October the Kirk Session gave approval to our Focus Group to progress to the next stage of negotiations and instructed our Financial Property Management Team to proceed to plan a strategy to raise funds.

We shall keep the Congregation informed as the scheme progresses further.

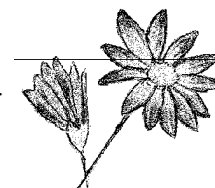
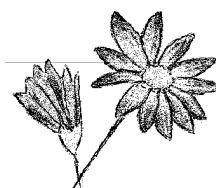

CHRISTIAN AID — DID YOU KNOW?

Their positions in society could not have been in greater contrast. He was the lofty commander of the King's army in Aram, in what is now Syria, and she was a lowly foreigner, a slave and a girl.

But his position and status could not prevent him from the disease of leprosy. That he found hope in a message from a little foreign slave girl is just the beginning of his humble journey to healing.

She had been taken captive during one of Naaman's army's raids and brought to Aram. As a slave girl, snatched from her home, she might have wished him the full consequences of his leprosy. That she was willing to provide information to relieve the suffering of her captor was a mark of her generous and forgiving character.

On October 11 the International Day of the Girl Child was a day set aside to recognise girls' rights and the unique challenges girls face around the world.

Negele Dhiba lives in Ethiopia. As a girl, she is expected to fetch water, collect firewood, keep the house clean and help her mother prepare the food that her father and brothers will eat.

She knows her own mind. She confidently talks about the ways in which girls are married young in exchange for cattle, as well as the inequalities that exist between women and men.

And despite all of her many responsibilities at home, Negele works hard at school, studies long into the night and has dreams for her future.

Now that she has entered the second decade of her life she faces particular challenges - obtaining quality secondary and higher education, avoiding child marriage, receiving information and services related to puberty and reproductive health, and protecting herself against unwanted pregnancy, sexually transmitted disease and gender-based violence.

But it is possible to overcome these challenges, with courage and support.

We don't read anything more of that little nameless girl who changed Naaman's life.

We never find out if she gets reunited with her family, or if she is thanked for her message of hope. We never find out whether she stays a slave for the rest of her days, or if she gets freed in her adult years. We never find out whether she returns to the place of her capture or if she finds a safe place to call home in Aram/Syria.

What we do know is that as a foreigner in a strange land she changes the story for Naaman. May she be an inspiration and challenge to us all to be open in finding hope in unexpected places and to welcome the stranger, whoever they are.

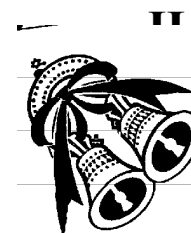
