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Musings from the Manse

This year on the 8th of May, we commemorated 80 years since VE Day, Victory in Europe. Leading up to VE Day, the TV news was full of people reminiscing about the street parties and how life was much simpler then and folks were much happier. Of course, that's not the real truth, because the 1940's were dominated by the atrocities of the Second World War, rationing, blackouts and bombing raids.

People tend to have selective memories. I even look back on my own childhood 30 or so years after the end of the war and remember it as an idyllic time. Long summer days when the sun shone, and it never rained. Life was good with picnics and trips to the park and playing out in the street until it was dark. Games of tig and rounders and 'kerby'.

But if I remember correctly, these were the days of miners' strikes and power cuts. high unemployment and rising inflations. Cities like Glasgow where I grew up had high levels of poverty and deprivation. Yet, people still remember these times with fondness – 'we were poor, but we were happy'. Were we really?

The Israelites similarly had selective memories. In the Old Testament book of Numbers, we see a people who are good at complaining. In the wilderness they get bored of the manna that God has provided for them and grumble about how good they had it back in Egypt and the food they enjoyed, 'the cucumbers, melons, leeks, onions and garlic' instead of the boring old manna they have now. Amazingly, they have somehow forgotten that they were slaves back in Egypt. Even when they were almost at the Promised Land, they still thought that they might be better off in Egypt. They forgot that God had led them out of Egypt and fed them with manna but promised a land of milk and honey.

When we are going through tough times, we tend to look back at the past with rose tinted spectacles. Instead of looking back with longing, we should cling to God's guidance and provision for us here and now, and trust God to continue to look after us in the future. God promises us that the best is yet to come, 'No eye has seen, no ear has heard, no mind has conceived what God has prepared for those who love him' (1 Corinthians 2: 9) Blessings, Annette

Knitting for life

I was in the craft shop looking at the wool and saw dishcloth cotton – the real old fashioned kind. Immediately, I was successful as on our first knitting lesson was to knit a dishcloth and from then on, my mum, Granny and great aunts were continually supplied with dishcloths!

Back in the 60's both boys and girls were taught how to use a needle and thread. In the infants, this was made possible as we used Binka. I remember we all made a design using the plus, minus and multiplication symbols. This was followed by the girls learning how to knit.

After our dishcloths, we were introduced to the purl stitch and knitted a scarf. In Primary 6, we made ski hats and there began my downfall. We now had to follow (which to me was a mystery), a knitting pattern. Eventually I produced my slightly lopsided red ski hat with yellow zig zags and its pompom on top. This was very fashionable at the time and despite the odd wee hole, I wore it with pride. Primary 7 was a trial as we now had to use four needles and thin wool to knit socks. I have to admit my Granny helped me "turn the heel". Granny was always knitting socks and kept my dad and his golfing pals supplied for years.

When I tried sewing threading the needle took up half my lesson. Still using Binka but learning to oversew, we made needle cases. From there, we progressed to sewing a "dolly bag". This was to hold our gym shoes or "sannies" as we called them. All regulation black canvas plimsoles – no need to eye up a pal's trainers with envy back then. In Primary 7 we had to sew a stuffed animal made from felt. I chose a squirrel but attaching the tail was difficult and the squirrel arrived home with a large hole and stuffing oozing out.

Nowadays, I'm not much of a handwork person but I do crochet the odd blanket now and again. It made me think life can be similar to making a blanket. Sometimes it's plain and simple, sometimes it gets complicated. If that happens, I have to ask for help. Sometimes if I've made a bigger mistake, I have to go back, unravelling all my work as I go. The wool can get in a knot or even worse a tangle so patience and time are needed to sort out the mess. After a while, a well-worn blanket can get a bit frayed at the edges but with a little care and attention this can be resolved. The blanket can be enhanced with different colours of wool. They need to be woven in with some care and fastened with love.

As Christians, just like making a blanket, we have a pattern to follow. Sometimes we want to deviate from this pattern, or we choose not to follow the pattern. Following the pattern makes us uncomfortable especially as we can't see the finished product. However, we have to trust that God has a unique pattern for us and that His pattern is the best.

Finance Report

Plea from Finance Team

As you may have seen from the Money Matters leaflet, Carnoustie Trinity had a deficit in 2024 of £9,024 and we are projecting a deficit for 2025. The General Fund showed a deficit of over £4,500 for the three months to 31 March 2025 and there is an overspend on the Fabric Fund of over £6,400 so far. The Fabric Fund balance at 1 January 2025 was £17,686 and during the period to 31 March 2025 £24,000 was spent on repairs and maintenance of our buildings with £20,800 being spent on stonework repairs at Newton Panbride.

General Fund outgoings in April were £13,380 while our April monthly income, including Gift Aid was £12,218, meaning we have a shortfall of £1,162 for the month and unless we increase our income this could be replicated each month. A further £1,482 was spent on fabric in April meaning that the overspend for the Fabric Fund by the end of 30 April was £7,725.

Like us all, our Church faces rising bills for repairs, heat and light etc. but we can't continue to use past years' savings to meet running costs without trying to increase givings in order to meet our expenditure.

When we joined the Church, we all promised to give of our time, talents and money and while the Team do not expect members to do without essentials, we respectfully ask all members to reconsider their church givings, especially if they haven't been increased for some years. The Finance Team encourages members to give by Standing Order or through the FWO Scheme because regular giving by either of these methods helps the Church to budget, rather than receiving varying sums of money in the 'plate' on a Sunday when members attend.

If you are a taxpayer, please ask for a Gift Aid form as the church can reclaim 25p for every £ you give. Just ask any member of the team for Gift Aid and/or Standing Order forms.

Its not just money that is required to maintain our Church and keep our buildings wind and watertight and in good order. Paying for services currently contracted out to businesses and which may be done by volunteers, is a costly option. As mentioned earlier, when joining the church, we all promised to give of our time and use our talents to help the church. Your talent might be flower arranging, computer or admin skills, helping with the church cleaning, DIY, ground maintenance, delivering magazines, joining the Sunday welcome team etc. If possible, please volunteer to help maintain our church in some way.

General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) forms

As only 50% of these slips have been returned we have extended the date for returning the forms to 31 May 2025. If you don't hand back a signed GDPR form, the Church cannot retain your personal information such as name, address etc. Please complete the form and return it to the Treasurer, Pat Thornton, 9 Collier Street, Carnoustie. Sorting everything out will take time, as well as willing volunteers, so if anyone can help, even for a few hours, please get in touch for details. We hope to get this work completed by the end of June at the latest so that when the renovations begin, the building will be ready.

Of course, the pews will have to be removed as well before the end of June so anyone interested in purchasing a pew, please get in touch. Some are already spoken for so if you are interested, let us know sooner rather than later. It would be great to know they will go to good homes. Some of the pews will be kept and the wood used to make items for display in the renovated building but more of that later!!

Fund raising is still going on so if anyone has any ideas to raise money, please get in touch, all ideas are welcome. Thanks to everyone for their continued support.
